8. PRESENTATIONS

A. Commissioner Director Arnone – Presentation on Status of County's Acquisition of Boathouse Property

Mayor McGreevy provided background on the boatyard property, then invited Commissioner Director Arnone to the floor. Commissioner Director Arnone provided background information regarding the boat yard property and the current use. Commissioner Director Arnone spoke about Chris' Marina on the border of Red Bank and Middletown, noting the County has taken a role in using Open Space Grant funds for water recreation uses. Commissioner Director Arnone further spoke of the funds available for communities under the open space grant fund. Commissioner Director Arnone explained the price has been negotiated based on appraisals, the environmental research has been completed, and the title search is going on. Commissioner Director Arnone provided further details of the thoughts for the enhancements to the marina and area surrounding. Further discussion followed on preservation in Monmouth County and the beautification of the Boathouse property.

Mayor McGreevy opened the floor to the public for Commissioner Director Arnone.

Mr. Christopher DeFoe, trustee for the property, asked if people would still be able to maintain their boats there. Commissioner Director Arnone responded.

Mrs. Arlene Sciarappa, thanked Commissioner Director Arnone for taking the time to find the resources to preserve the property.

Ms. Alexis Finch, asked questions about the plans including dredging and the cost of upkeep. Commissioner Director Arnone noted the cost would be incurred by the County which comes out of the park system. Ms. Finch asked about the environmental reviews that were done, raising concerns about contamination. Commissioner Director Arnone responded that the work went through a certified LSRP Engineer. Discussion continued on possible passive uses and popularity of water sports, remediation and testing of the water, parking and a road study, riparian rights, and zoning concerns for park use property near neighboring residents.

Ms. Kim Karalovich, asked how much the grant is worth; Commissioner Director Arnone noted it is not a grant it is a property purchase and the use of open space tax voted on every November. Commissioner Director Arnone further detailed how open space tax is collected and spent and that the County Park System. Discussion continued on who is allowed to use the facilities. Ms. Karalovich asked if Neptune City would have a response from EMS that would meet National Standards, requesting if the County would assist with that; Freehold Director Arnone noted there is a need, and that the Sheriff's office has begun piloting a program for EMS Services which is hoped to be expanded.

Mayor McGreevy noted this is private property.

Mrs. Sciarappa thanked the police department and EMS services for their response to her medical emergency.

Mr. Anthony Sussino, noted the Chris Marina is a beautiful park and was excellent work.

C/Renee thanked Freehold Commissioner Arnone for everything he is doing to make the Boatyard project happen. C/Renee noted she is hoping to see a floating kayak launch. C/Kocsis thanked Freehold Director Arnone for attending. C/Renee asked the next steps; Commissioner Director Arnone replied.

B. Proclamation - Recognizing April as Autism Acceptance Month Mayor McGreevy read the Proclamation into the record as follows:

RECOGNIZING APRIL AS AUTISM ACCEPTANCE MONTH

WHEREAS, The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) estimates that 1 in every 36 children in the United States are among the more than 5,437,988 Americans living with an Autism Spectrum Disorder (ADS) and New Jersey has the third highest rate of autism in the nation: 1 in 35 children, or 2.9% of 8-year-old children.

WHEREAS, it is important to further increase awareness about autism signs, symptoms, and opportunities through information and referrals, events, resources and community partnerships with businesses and organizations dedicated to building inclusive experiences; and

WHEREAS, Autism rates are increasing in New Jersey and across the United States due to the growing awareness of autism and changes to the condition's diagnostic criteria.

WHEREAS Autism rates vary dramatically between states, which experts believe is a reflection of varying levels of autism awareness and of services offered in those states.

WHEREAS Autism New Jersey believes that the autism community should be served by qualified, competent, and fairly-compensated professionals. To achieve these goals, initiatives are needed to ensure a robust pipeline and stable workforce of professionals across disciplines (e.g., behavior analysis, medicine); and

WHEREAS People with autism are reported to be seven times more likely to have police encounters than their typical peers; and

WHEREAS The Monmouth County Special Needs Registry is a voluntary service open to all citizens with disabilities who reside, attend school or are employed in Monmouth County. The registry was created to help police officers and other emergency service personnel to better assist residents with special needs in the event of an emergency by providing those

first responders with vital information regarding a registrant's disability, emergency contact information, a physical description and current photograph of the registrant.

WHEREAS, during Autism Acceptance Month, we recommit our resolve to support those with Autism Spectrum Disorder as they continue to strengthen our families, communities, Nation and World.

NOW THEREFORE, I, Rachel McGreevy, Mayor of the Borough of Neptune City, along with the Governing Body, do hereby proclaim April 2024 as Autism Acceptance Month. I encourage all citizens to learn what more they can do to support individuals on the Autism Spectrum and their families.

9. MAYOR'S REPORT - Mayor Rachel McGreevy

Mayor McGreevy thanked the Community for coming together on March 29 for the Autism Awareness Flag raising. Mayor McGreevy thanked C/Thomas and Ms. Zani for helping coordinate the event and spoke of the support for the children with Autism and their families. Mayor McGreevy shared information about the first annual Women's History Month event held to raise money for the Sarah Stern Scholarship. Mayor McGreevy thanked Girls Scout Troop 902, the fellow members of the Governing Body, local women owned small businesses including JB Couture Cupcakes, Deedee's Lights, Joan Dey, Artist and Judi Hull, Artist and a special shout out to Pop's Liquors and Bruno's sandwiches for their donations.

C/Farley shared a flyer for Sensory Day at I-Play America this Wednesday, April 10. There will be a 10th Annual Rebuilding Warriors fundraiser with K-9 Millie on Sunday, April 28 at the Headliner for a \$25 donation.

D. COUNCILMEMBER GLEN KOCSIS, ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE

C/Kocsis met with the Emergency Services Committee this past week to discuss the three-year plan. C/Kocsis also met with the Historical Committee to begin planning for the 250th Anniversary of America Event, the committee also discussed the town essay due by July 1 and possibly displaying items in the cabinet in Borough Hall.

ORDINANCE 2024-03
BOROUGH OF NEPTUNE CITY
COUNTY OF MONMOUTH

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOROUGH OF NEPTUNE CITY MONMOUTH COUNTY, STATE OF NEW JERSEY, TO EXCEED THE 2024 MUNICIPAL BUDGET APPROPRIATIONS LIMITS AND TO ESTABLISH A CAP BANK (N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.14)

WHEREAS, the Local Government Cap Law, N.J.S. 40A: 4-45.1 et seq., provides that in the preparation of its annual budget, a municipality shall limit any increase in said budget to 2.5% unless authorized by ordinance to increase it to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, subject to certain exceptions; and,

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.15a provides that a municipality may, when authorized by ordinance, appropriate the difference between the amount of its actual final appropriation and the 3.5% percentage rate as an exception to its final appropriations in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

WHEREAS, the Borough Council of the Borough of Neptune City in the County of Monmouth finds it advisable and necessary to increase its 2024 budget by up to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, in the interest of promoting the health, safety and welfare of the citizens; and,

WHEREAS, the Borough Council hereby determines that a 3.5% increase in the budget for said year, amounting to \$71,556.73 in excess of the increase in final appropriations otherwise permitted by the Local Government Cap Law, is advisable and necessary; and,

WHEREAS, the Borough Council hereby determines that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED, by the Borough Council of the Borough of Neptune City, in the County of Monmouth, a majority of the full authorized membership of this governing body affirmatively concurring, that, in the 2024 budget year, the final appropriations of the Borough of Neptune City shall, in accordance with this ordinance and N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.14, be increased by 3.5%, amounting to \$71,556.73, and that the 2024 municipal budget for the Borough of Neptune City be approved and adopted in accordance with this ordinance; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that any that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that a certified copy of this ordinance as introduced be filed with the Director of the Division of Local Government Services within 5 days of introduction; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that a certified copy of this ordinance upon adoption, with the recorded vote included thereon, be filed with said Director within 5 days after such adoption.

Mayor McGreevy read the ordinance into the record by title.

Mr. Corlies Chong thanked everyone on the governing body, noting he is excited about the property being redeveloped. Mr. Chong confirmed what is being voted on this evening is the transfer of property for \$1 and the cost of remediation, the phases of the redevelopment agreement. Mr. Chong provided a further outline of the redevelopment agreement and ordinance for the transfer and sale of the property. Mr. Chong asked the Borough and Developer to consider an alternative to the East Coast Ice Project by proposing additional living space. Mr. Chong pointed to the redevelopment of the Charlene Motel. Mr. Chong opined that storage units are an underutilization of space. Mr. Chong noted the community is not opposed to a yes vote, but hoped both parties would sit down and discuss the matter. Mr. Chong raised concerns about the Laird Avenue development. Mr. Chong noted the RDA allows for change, that a yes vote is not opposed and that it becomes a win-win-win. Discussion continued on having a member of the community involved in the process.

Mr. Chong presented a petition to the Governing Body requesting condos not storage units.

Ms. Kim Karalovich asked if Laird Park would be eligible for Green Acres park; Mayor McGreevy noted Laird Park needs to be upkept and the fact that the redeveloper is willing to improve the park is a great part of the RDA. Mayor McGreevy further noted other options for the park have been sought.

Commissioner Director Arnone noted he took the Ice House and Charlene Motel down, further explaining the areas were meant for smart planning and to bring revenue while keeping the quality of life for the people in the area. Commissioner Director Arnone further noted that any improvements in the area have been at no cost to the taxpayer, further suggesting to not lose the opportunity. Mayor McGreevy confirmed that the demolition cost of the Ice House is not part of the cost to the developer and is another value being provided.

Ms. Maura Fitzsimmons requested the Council list of what Mr. Chong had to say. Ms. Fitzsimmons expressed her displeasure with the price for which Field Street is being sold. Ms. Fitzsimmons expressed the hope for townhouses or single-family homes, asking for a pause and re-evaluation which would be more beneficial for her neighborhood.

Mayor McGreevy thanked the residents for the petition and with an abundance of courtesy, Mayor McGreevy asked for the ordinance to be tabled.

ORDINANCE 2024-04 BOROUGH OF NEPTUNE CITY COUNTY OF MONMOUTH

ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING ENTRY OF A REAL ESTATE PURCHASE AND SALE AGREEMENT WITH GENESIS REDEVELOPMENT, LLC AS THE DESIGNATED REDEVELOPER OF BLOCK 13, LOT 1 (87 ROSEWOOD PLACE) WITHIN THE EAST COAST ICE HOUSE REDEVELOPMENT AREA

WHEREAS, the Borough of Neptune City (the "<u>Borough</u>") is the owner of certain parcels of land located within the East Coast Ice House Redevelopment Plan ("<u>Redevelopment Plan</u>") Area, which includes Block 13, Lot 1 (87 Rosewood Place) on the Borough's official tax map (the "<u>Borough Property</u>"); and

WHEREAS, the Borough has designated Genesis Redevelopment, LLC (the "<u>Redeveloper</u>") as the designated redeveloper of the Borough Property and is entering a Redevelopment Agreement (the "<u>Redevelopment Agreement</u>") for the redevelopment of the Borough Property into a commercial use permitted under the Redevelopment Plan (the "<u>Project</u>"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to $\underline{\text{N.J.S.A.}}$ 40A:12A-8(g) the Borough is authorized to "convey property or improvements to any other party . . . without public bidding and at such prices and upon such terms as it deems reasonable, provided that the . . . conveyance is made in conjunction with a redevelopment plan "; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with the Redevelopment Agreement and the Redevelopment Plan (as defined in the Redevelopment Agreement), the Borough has determined that the proposed Real Estate Purchase and Sale Agreement is essential to the development of the Project.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Borough Council of the Borough of Neptune City in the County of Monmouth, State of New Jersey as follows:

SECTION 1. The above recitals are incorporated by reference as if fully set forth herein.

SECTION 2. The Borough Council hereby accepts and approves the Real Estate Purchase and Sale Agreement for the conveyance of Block 13, Lot 1 to Genesis Redevelopment, LLC as the designated redeveloper of the Property One Dollar (\$1.00), plus all costs associated with the environmental remediation of the Borough Property, and other good and valuable consideration as shall be provided by the Buyer in accordance herewith, subject to the terms of the Redevelopment Agreement.

SECTION 3. The Borough Council hereby authorizes and directs the Mayor or Borough Administrator to execute the Real Estate Purchase and Sale Agreement upon adoption of this Ordinance.

SECTION 4. The Borough Council hereby authorizes and directs the Borough Administrator, Chief Financial Officer, and other Borough employees and agents to take any necessary and appropriate actions to effectuate the implementation of this Ordinance and the Real Estate Purchase and Sale Agreement.

SECTION 5. All ordinances or resolutions of the Borough which are inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed as to the extent of such inconsistency.

SECTION 6. If any section, subsection, clause or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the remaining portion of this Ordinance.

SECTION 7. This Ordinance shall take effect upon final passage, approval and publication in accordance with law.

APPROVING AND AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF AN AMENDMENT TO THE ORDER TERMS BETWEEN BOROUGH OF NEPTUNE CITY AND SEAGRAVE FIRE APPARATUS, LLC

WHEREAS, the Borough of Neptune City ("Borough") and Seagrave Fire Apparatus, LLC ("Seagrave") are parties to an agreement ("Agreement") for the provision of a custom fire apparatus, dated December 13, 2021; and

WHEREAS, following execution of the Agreement, Seagrave represented to the Borough that, due to supply chain limitations, the original terms of the Agreement have become commercially impracticable and the cost of the apparatus had substantially increased; and

WHEREAS, after extensive negotiations between the Borough and Seagrave, the Parties agreed to revise the Agreement to include a material cost increase of \$100,895 in exchange for the Borough's receipt of a \$15,000 parts and service voucher, a \$5,000 credit towards the Borough's attendance at the final inspection, and a revised delivery date of October 31, 2024, among other consideration; and

WHEREAS, the Parties wish to enter into an Amendment to the Order Terms ("Amendment") to reflect the revised agreement, attached hereto and incorporated herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Mayor and Borough Council of the Borough of Neptune City, County of Monmouth, State of New Jersey, that the Amendment to Order Terms between the Borough of Neptune City and Seagrave Fire Apparatus, LLC, is hereby approved, and the Mayor is duly authorized to execute same.
