MAYORS REPORT: Mayor Andrew Wardell

Mayor Wardell reported on the following:

- A. 39 New cases in Monmouth County

- 1. The county is offering vaccinations w/o appointments at the Brookdale Campus on T,W,Th from 8am to 4:30pm and Saturdays from 8 am to noon. All county resident over 18 are encouraged to get vaccinated

B. Security and safety

- 1. Capt. Mitchell met with the company we used to upgrade our security system at Borough Hall to price out the cost for a new camera system at all parks, but with a priority on Memorial.
- 2. I would like to meet with the law and ordinance committee to draft an ordinance for the parking situation. As of now the same limits on parking that was implemented by police order last summer will be put into place by Memorial Day
- 3. Thanks to DPW for installing the new Bocce shed to protect our bocce equipment.

ADMINISTRATORS REPORT: Kevin Kane

Administrator Kane reported:

1. 2021 Municipal Budget

As we have stated at the past two council meetings, the public hearing on the budget will be held at the next council meeting on May 24, 2021.

2. Additional Kayak Racks at Memorial Park

Discussed the construction of additional kayak racks at Memorial Park with our DPW Director, The costs would be approximately \$1,000.- for 15 additional racks and \$2,000.- for 30 new racks. Our CFO confirmed that the funds are available, just need direction from Mayor and Council.

ADMINISTRATION & FINANCE- John Pietrunti

C/Pietrunti reported he will hold a meeting on Friday. He wants to discuss the Audit and corrective action. C/Pietrunti would like to discuss in committee about having safety/lifeguard at the beach. He also stated that "truckers" in the area of the First Aid are leaving garbage that needs to be addressed. C/Pietrunti also discussed he would like to set up an Alzheimer's virtual screening. It would be free to residents.

PUBLIC WORKS- Pamela Renee

C/Renee reported the sweeper was out last week. Will be back out the week of May 24th. DPW is working at Adams Filed and replacing some of the faded stop signs around town.

C/Renee announced the Horseshoe Crab tagging is beginning 5/25/2021 and looking for volunteers. They will train and there are various dates that tagging will take place.

LAW & ORDINANCE – Brian Thomas

C/Thomas reported the committee is working on a Parking Ordinance for Riverview Avenue, no littering signs and cameras at Memorial Park. He suggested reaching out to an organization for a ramp to help with the gazebo ADA needs. He reminded us that the blood drive is May 28 and the response has been great. C/Thomas thanked Mayor Wardell for putting the resolution on the agenda to honor the Police.

BOND ORDINANCE 2021 - 02

BOND ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE STEINER AVENUE PEDESTRIAN AND ADA IMPROVEMENTS PHASE 3, APPROPRIATING \$425,000 AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$245,395 BONDS OR NOTES OF THE BOROUGH FOR FINANCING PART OF THE COST THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Borough Council of the Borough of Neptune City, in the County of Monmouth, New Jersey (not less than two-thirds of all members thereof affirmatively concurring) as follows:

Section 1. The capital improvement described in Section 3 of this Bond Ordinance is hereby authorized by the Borough of Neptune City, New Jersey. For the capital improvement described in Section 3, there is hereby appropriated the sum of \$425,000, which includes \$50,000 in costs as permitted by *N.J.S.A.* 40A:2-20 and a Community Development Block Grant in the amount of \$179,605 that satisfies the down payment for the said purpose as required by the Local Bond Law.

Section 2. In order to finance the cost of the Steiner Avenue Pedestrian and ADA Improvements Phase 3 not covered by the aforementioned grant, negotiable bonds are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount of \$245,395 pursuant to the Local Bond Law. In anticipation of issuance of the bonds, negotiable bond anticipation notes are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to and within the limitations prescribed by the Local Bond Law.

Section 3. The Steiner Avenue Pedestrian and ADA Improvements Phase 3 are hereby authorized and the purpose for which the bonds are to be issued. The minimum period of usefulness is ten years.

Section 4. All bond anticipation notes issued hereunder shall mature at such times as may be determined by the chief financial officer; provided that no note shall mature later than one year from its date. The notes shall bear interest at such rate or rates and be in such form as may be determined by the chief financial officer. The chief financial officer shall determine all matters in connection with notes issued pursuant to this ordinance, and the chief financial officer's signature upon the notes shall be conclusive evidence as to all such determinations. All notes issued hereunder may be renewed from time to time subject to the provisions of *N.J.S.A. 40A:2-8(a)*. The chief financial officer is hereby authorized to sell part or all of the notes from time to time at public or private sale and to deliver them to the purchaser thereof upon receipt of payment of the purchase price plus accrued interest from their dates to the date of delivery thereof. The chief financial officer is directed to report in writing to the governing body at the meeting next succeeding the date when any sale or delivery of the notes pursuant to this ordinance is made. Such report must include the amount, the description, the interest rate, and the maturity schedule of the notes sold, the price obtained, and the name of the purchaser.

Section 5. The capital budget of the Borough of Neptune City is hereby amended to conform with the provisions of this Ordinance to the extent of any inconsistency therewith; and the resolutions promulgated by the Local Finance Board showing full detail of the amended Capital Budget and Capital Program as approved by the Director of the Division of Local Government Services, is on file with the Municipal Clerk and is available for public inspection.

- **Section 6.** The following additional matters are hereby determined, declared, recited and stated:
- (a) The purchase described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance is not a current expense. It is an improvement that the Borough may lawfully undertake as a general improvement, and no part of the cost thereof has been or shall be specially assessed on property specially benefitted thereby.
- (b) The Supplemental Debt Statement required by the Local Bond Law has been duly prepared and filed in the Office of the Clerk, and a complete executed duplicate thereof has been filed in the Office of the Director of the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs of the State of New Jersey. The gross debt of the Borough of Neptune City is increased by the authorization of the bonds or notes provided in this bond ordinance by \$245,395, and the obligations authorized herein will be within all debt limitations prescribed by law.
- (c) An aggregate amount not exceeding \$50,000 for items of expense listed in and permitted under *N.J.S.A.* 40A:2-20 may be included in the costs of the purchase authorized in Section 3 hereof and is included in the foregoing estimate thereof.
- **Section 7.** The full faith and credit of the Borough are hereby pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of an interest on the obligations authorized by this bond ordinance. The obligations shall be direct, unlimited obligations of the Borough and the Borough shall be obligated to levy ad valorem taxes upon all the taxable property within the Borough for the payment of the obligations and interest thereon without limitation on rate or amount.
- **Section 8.** That in the event any moneys are received by the Borough from the United States of America, or from the State of New Jersey or any of its agencies, or from any other sources

for the purchase provided for herein prior to the issuance of any of the bonds or notes authorized by this ordinance, the amount of such bonds or notes authorized herein shall be reduced by the amount so received prior to the issuance of any such bonds or notes.

Section 9. This bond ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after the first publication thereof after final adoption, as provided by the Local Bond Law.

BOND ORDINANCE 2021 - 03

BOND ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE IMPROVEMENTS TO ADAMS FIELD, APPROPRIATING \$400,000 AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$150,000 BONDS OR NOTES OF THE BOROUGH FOR FINANCING PART OF THE COST THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Borough Council of the Borough of Neptune City, in the County of Monmouth, New Jersey (not less than two-thirds of all members thereof affirmatively concurring) as follows:

Section 1. The capital improvement described in Section 3 of this Bond Ordinance is hereby authorized by the Borough of Neptune City, New Jersey. For the capital improvement

described in Section 3, there is hereby appropriated the sum of \$400,000, which includes \$50,000 in costs as permitted by *N.J.S.A.* 40A:2-20 and a Monmouth County Open Space Grant in the amount of \$250,000 that satisfies the down payment for the said purpose as required by the Local Bond Law.

Section 2. In order to finance the cost of the Improvements to Adams Field not covered by the aforementioned grant, negotiable bonds are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount of \$150,000 pursuant to the Local Bond Law. In anticipation of issuance of the bonds, negotiable bond anticipation notes are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to and within the limitations prescribed by the Local Bond Law.

Section 3. The Improvements to Adams Field are hereby authorized and the purpose for which the bonds are to be issued. The minimum period of usefulness is ten years.

Section 4. All bond anticipation notes issued hereunder shall mature at such times as may be determined by the chief financial officer; provided that no note shall mature later than one year from its date. The notes shall bear interest at such rate or rates and be in such form as may be determined by the chief financial officer. The chief financial officer shall determine all matters in connection with notes issued pursuant to this ordinance, and the chief financial officer's signature upon the notes shall be conclusive evidence as to all such determinations. All notes issued hereunder may be renewed from time to time subject to the provisions of *N.J.S.A. 40A:2-8(a)*. The chief financial officer is hereby authorized to sell part or all of the notes from time to time at public or private sale and to deliver them to the purchaser thereof upon receipt of payment of the purchase price plus accrued interest from their dates to the date of delivery thereof. Section 8. That in the event any moneys are received by the Borough from the United

States of America, or from the State of New Jersey or any of its agencies, or from any other sources

for the purchase provided for herein prior to the issuance of any of the bonds or notes authorized

by this ordinance, the amount of such bonds or notes authorized herein shall be reduced by the

amount so received prior to the issuance of any such bonds or notes.

Section 9. This bond ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days after the first

publication thereof after final adoption, as provided by the Local Bond Law.

RESOLUTION 2021-84

SUPPORT OF LAW ENFORCEMENT APPRECIATION MONTH

WHEREAS, Law enforcement and correctional police officers in this State and throughout the nation are routinely called upon to serve and protect their fellow citizens; and

WHEREAS, Law enforcement officers protect the community by responding to horrendous events and acting heroically to save the lives of others; and

WHEREAS, Correctional police officers provide public safety and security through the custody and management of those individuals incarcerated within the criminal justice system; and

WHEREAS, It is increasingly dangerous to perform these jobs in a world where law enforcement and correctional police officers are targeted for the uniforms they wear and the duties they perform in service to their community; and

WHEREAS, Law enforcement and correctional police officers in this State and throughout the nation serve with valor, dignity, and integrity; and

WHEREAS, As of October 2020, 235 law enforcement officers died in the line of duty in the United States in less than one year, including nine officers in New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, As COVID-19 continues to spread around the country, the first responders on the front lines are increasingly vulnerable to contracting the virus and at least eight correctional police officers have died resulting from this pandemic; and

WHEREAS, these officer's deaths are a sober reminder that our nation's law enforcement and correctional police officers face danger every day they carry out their sworn duty to protect the citizens of this country; and

WHEREAS, Countless other law enforcement and correctional police officers are injured and disabled each year while performing their duties; and

WHEREAS, these burdens are carried not only by law enforcement and correctional police officers, but also by their families who make personal sacrifices in order for these officers to carry out their duties; and

WHEREAS, in light of recent negativity directed toward law enforcement nationally, there is a need to show law enforcement and correctional police officers that our citizens recognize the difficult career these officers have chosen; and

WHEREAS, These men and women, by their distinctive service and dedicated efforts as law enforcement and correctional police officers, have earned our highest respect and deepest gratitude;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Council of the Neptune City, County of Monmouth, State of New Jersey that we support the adoption a Joint Assembly Resolution (197) designating the month of May of each year as "Law Enforcement and Correctional Police Officer Appreciation Month in the State of New Jersey to encourage the

citizens of this State to join in the observance of this month and provide appreciation for the law enforcement and correctional police officers who serve and protect them.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Mayor and Council of Neptune City, County of Monmouth, State of New Jersey that we, preceding an adoption by the State Legislature, hereby designate the Month of May of each year as "Law Enforcement and Correctional Police Officer Appreciation Month" in the Borough of Neptune City to encourage the residents of our Borough to join in the observance of this month of appreciation for law enforcement and correctional police officers who serve and protect them within our municipality and within the Neptune City Police Department.

WHEREAS, such resolution of certification shall be adopted by the Governing Body no later than forty-five days after the receipt of the annual audit as per the regulations of the Local Finance Board, and,

WHEREAS, all members of the governing body have received and have familiarized themselves with, at least, the minimum requirements of the Local Finance Board of the State of New Jersey, as stated aforesaid and have subscribed to the affidavit, as provided by the Local Finance Board, and

WHEREAS, failure to comply with the regulations of the Local Finance Board of the State of New Jersey may subject the members of the local governing body to the penalty provisions of R.S. 52:27BB-52, to wit:

R.S. 52:27BB-52: A local officer or member of a local governing body who, after a date fixed for compliance, fails or refuses to obey an order of the director (Director of Local Government Services), under the provisions of this Article, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, may be fined not more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) or imprisoned for not more than one year, or both, in addition shall forfeit his office.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, That the Mayor and Council of the *Borough of Neptune City* hereby states that it has complied with the promulgation of the Local Finance Board of the State of New Jersey dated July 30, 1968 and does hereby submit a certified copy of this resolution and the required affidavit to said Board to show evidence of said compliance.
