MAYORS REPORT: Mayor Andrew Wardell

Mayor Wardell reported the following:

I.Covid-19

- A. Cases have seen a spike as of lately. It is more important that people keep getting vaccinated.
- B. Monmouth County has COVID-19 vaccines available at the Montessori Children's Learning Center, located at Brookdale Community College in Lincroft, with no appointment necessary on Tuesdays from 2 to 6 p.m.
- C. Monmouth County will offer free COVID-19 testing on Wednesday, Dec. 1 in Asbury Park from 4 to 7 p.m. at the Asbury Park Transportation Center located at 1 Municipal Plaza.

II. Holiday Celebrations

- 1. Tree Lighting ceremony will be held on Wednesday Dec 1, 2021 at Memorial Park
 - 1. Hot Chocolate will be served
- 2. Borough Holiday Party will be held the following Saturday at 10am
 - 1. Children will be given a gift, treats, and a picture with Santa Clause.

III. Tax Assessments

- 1. Many people who received their assessments were a bit shocked to see the assessment of their properties go up.
 - 1. This is mandate from the County Board of Taxation and not a Municipal decision
 - 2. The Assessments are based on multiple factors but the most impactful is the property sales.
 - 3. We have seen a significant increase in the value of homes in Neptune City based on the sale prices.
- 1. Currently the average home purchased in Neptune City is going for \$441,000.00 which is nearly a 20% increase in one year
 - 4. This year the average increase to assessments in Neptune City is 9% increase
- 1. Therefore, if your property assessment is either at or below that 9% increase you will likely see a decrease in your taxes of no change from the previous year
- 2. If you are over that 9% you will likely increase your taxes.
- 3. The Borough has no control over your assessments.
 - 5. As in past years the total taxable value has increased which will cause the tax rate to decrease as it has every year since 2015. However, we will not know exactly how much the tax rate will change until July.
 - 6. Finally any property owner can file an appeal if they feel their value exceeds the market value. The time to file an appeal to the Monmouth County Tax Board is now till January 15th 2022.

IV. NCPD

- 1. Neptune City has flown their flags at half mast this week in honor of the passing of former Police Chief Richard Cottrell.
 - 1. Chief Cottrell served the Borough as Chief from 1966-84
 - 2. The Chief also was the author of our History book published in 1981 as a way to celebrate our Centennial.
- 2. I attended his viewing this past Sunday and it was a beautiful testament to such an important figure to our Town's history.

C/Pietrunti spoke with the Administrator and C/Kocsis about the budget process proceeding.

WHEREAS, the Borough of Neptune City lost a valued member of the community on November 17, 2021, with the death of Richard F. Cottrell, and

WHEREAS, born February 8, 1931 in the Borough of Neptune City, Richard attended Neptune City elementary schools and Manasquan High School, and

WHEREAS, Richard proudly served his country in the US Army from 1941-1952, and

WHEREAS, in 1952 Richard joined the Neptune City Police Department and rose through the ranks attaining the position of Chief of Police serving from 1966-1984, and

WHEREAS, Richard was appointed as Undersheriff of Monmouth County where he commanded the Law Enforcement Division of the Sheriff's Department for 10 years until he retired in 1994, and

WHEREAS, Richard spent a lifetime serving his beloved community of Neptune City. He authored two books, The Borough of Neptune City a Centennial History in 1981 and Neptune City Millennial History in 2000, and

WHEREAS, Richard was an active member of the United Methodist Church in Neptune City, he was a beloved husband, father, grandfather and great grandfather, and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the mayor and Council of the Borough of Neptune City recognize the significant contributions of Chief Richard F. Cottrell over the years and mourn his death, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Neptune City and the residents of the Borough recognize the remarkable achievements of Richard F. Cottrell and gratefully acknowledges and appreciates his many contributions to the community and offers their condolences to the Cottrell family.

WHEREAS, CME Associates is currently retained as Borough Engineer to the Borough of Neptune City; and

WHEREAS, there exists a need to obtain professional environmental consulting services related to the assessment and investigation of environmental contamination concerns at Adams Field; and

WHEREAS, the recreational project is expected to be supported by a Monmouth County Open Space Grant in the amount of \$250,000; and

WHEREAS, CME Associates has submitted a proposal, which is attached hereto and incorporated by reference, proposing to complete the foregoing tasks for a total fee of \$27,300; and

WHEREAS, the governing body wishes to have the Borough Engineer complete the professional environmental consulting services outlined in the attached document; and

WHEREAS, the Chief Financial Officer has certified as to the sufficiency of funds in budget line account Ordinance .

NOW THEREFORE, **BE IT RESOLVED** that the Borough Council of the Borough of Neptune City hereby approves the attached proposal and directs the Borough Engineer to proceed with same, consistent with the foregoing

Louise Gager 13 Smock Street had a question about the new store in the strip mall alongside of 7-eleven. She was informed it will be a butcher shop.

Sharon McSweeney 78 Lincoln Avenue stated she received a proposal for an indoor emissions assessment but would need to work with TFH for the process and observation.

Ted Wardell 9 Tucker Drive mentioned he was the Chairman of the Historical society and they will meet in mid-December. He also stated that Neptune City is unique to have a cemetery in the town and they would be contacting Rutgers to use their equipment to try and assess how many people are buried here.

He also wanted to commend our volunteer services for their time. Mr. Wardell also asked if the collection of plastic bag program will begin again.

Christine Oppegard 34 Myron Avenue explains the malodorous scent coming from Nylabone was starting to carry into her home. She called the DEP to make a statement about the smell and asks the mayor to personally contact the DEP and Board of Health to find a solution.

Sharon McSweiney 78 Lincoln expresses the lack of awareness regarding Nylabone from the DEP. Asks for straight froward answers concerning the safety of the odor.

Stacey Higgins 29 Coastal Drive following up with similar comments from Oppegard, also asked about the status regarding the Environmental Commission on whether Nylabone is a food production or manufacturing company.

Kelly Strazdas 3 Overbrook Pl encouraged that a local department other than the DEP may be able to resolve the issue by setting an odor ordinance in place. Asks how to be more interactive with the LUB agenda furthermore regarding the Ice and fuel company.
