Presentations

SPCA – TNR Program Presentation

Chief Licitra provided a history of the SPCA and the TNR program. Chief Licitra further provided the importance of the program regarding health perspectives, especially in reference to rabies containment. Chief Licitra noted the program has been very successful in Neptune City. Chief Licitra spoke about how the program works, specifying the roles of colony caregivers, the municipality and the SPCA. Chief Licitra invited questions, Mayor Wardell noted it is not a quick fix program; Chief Licitra concurred it is a 5-7 or 10 year program to see a difference. Further it was noted there is no way to completely eradicate feral cats, but the program helps to control the growth. Further discussion followed on the tracking and reporting of feral cats as well as the surrender and kitten foster programs. The Memorandum of Understanding was discussed whereby Neptune City and the SPCA agree to 100 cats per year under the program. Further discussion followed on the protection offered to colony caregivers by the SPCA by participating in the program. The size of colonies was also discussed.

Board of Education Report - None

Mayor's Report – Mayor Wardell

Mayor Wardell thanked all First Responders for all they do for the Borough of Neptune City. Mayor Wardell thanked the Honor Guard, EMTs, Firefighters and Public Works as well as Director Arnone, Assemblymembers Eulner and Piperno and members of Council for attending the 9/11 Ceremony. There will be a Land Use meeting tomorrow night. SRO Hansen organized a beach clean up at Memorial Park. Neptune City has begun accepting Cannabis Applications with the deadline being Friday, September 16. Mayor Wardell explained the application review process. C/Kocsis asked what would happen if no one applied; Administrator Jardine explained there was the first initial period which would then become rolling thereafter. New Jersey American Water is replacing the pipes along Steiner Avenue, the company will then be paving the road once the work is complete. The paving of 5th Avenue will be held until springtime. Mayor Wardell shared details of the upcoming Fall Food Truck Festival on September 24.

Council Reports

Administration & Finance – Council President Brian Thomas

Council President Thomas reported the Administration and Finance Committee had met and discussed the operations of the Community Center, as well as assisting the library with their programs. There is an upcoming meeting on the Capital Budget. Movie in the Park will be held Friday, 9/16 with a showing of “Up”. The application for Senior Freeze is coming up in October. Council President Thomas also thanked the Library for their donation to the School Library.

Human Services – Councilmember Scott Dellett

C/Dellett reported there would not be a 50/50 at the Food Truck Festival this year.

Administration & Justice – Councilmember Dana Farley

C/Farley shared a reminder from the Neptune City Police Department regarding the 5K Run or 2 mile walk in partnership with K9s for Veterans. Further discussion followed on the upcoming 5K. C/Farley spoke about driving defensively and being careful and mindful while driving, especially now that school is in session.

Law & Ordinance – Councilmember Glen Kocsis

C/Kocsis is scheduling a committee meeting. C/Kocsis reached out to Auditor Oliwa to find out why there no recommendations who had noted that Mr. Antonides and Mr. Jardine had done a good job.

Public Works – Councilwoman Danielle Pappas

C/Pappas reported loose leaf pick up begins September 15 – December 15.

Special Services – Councilmember Pamela Renee

C/Renee thanked the SPCA for making the presentation this evening. C/Renee reminded people they could cheer along the runners or walkers in the 5K, or also donate to K9s for Warriors. Local Neptune City artists are welcome to the Food Truck Festival. She thanked Mr. Antonides and Mr. Jardine for their efforts on the audit.

Administrator’s Report – Administrator Jardine

Administrator Jardine provided information about the Anchor Program which is replacing the Homestead Rebate benefit. The Anchor Program deadline is December 30. Administrator Jardine reiterated cannabis applications are due on 9/16. There is also a food drive ongoing until October 2. Administrator Jardine provided an overview of the road closure resolutions, noting the Chief of Police and Public Works had been informed. Administrator Jardine also provided the purpose of Resolution 2022-111 as dictated by the AOC.

Public Comments - Agenda Items Only

Mayor Wardell opened the meeting to the public on agenda items. There were no comments on Agenda items.

Ms. Alexis Finch provided details of the purpose of the road closure for their wedding. Council shared their support.

Mr. Ted Core spoke about issues with feral cats near his home which have disrupted his life since May. He further spoke of the inhumanity of releasing the cats during the summer and/or winter and the nuisance and unsanitary conditions that have become overbearing in his area. Mr. Kore acknowledged he did not know what the answer was, but wanted his voice heard. Mayor Wardell noted the Borough is aware of the situation and is taking steps to address the issues.

Ms. Andi Crosti shared her experiences and issues due to the circumstances as described by Mr. Kore.

Another resident shared her concerns with the unsanitary conditions.

Mr. Tom Kling shared his experiences with being overrun by cats throughout his neighborhood.

Mayor Wardell addressed the members of the audience in attendance who shared their complaints regarding being overrun by neighborhood cats. He provided an overview of the steps taken by the Borough and steps the residents can take on their own. Mayor Wardell promised he would do everything he could to find a solution. Discussion followed on the best route for the residents to take, which is to create a paper trail in writing by filing complaints.

RESOLUTION 2022-110**GOVERNING BODY CERTIFICATION OF THE 2021 ANNUAL AUDIT**

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40A:5-4 requires the governing body of every local unit to have made an annual audit of its books, accounts and financial transactions; and

WHEREAS, the Annual Report of Audit for the year 2021 has been filed by Oliwa & Company, Registered Municipal Accountants with the Municipal Clerk of the Borough of Neptune City pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:5-6, and a copy has been received by each member of the governing body on or before September 12, 2022; and

WHEREAS, R.S. 52:27BB-34 authorizes the Local Finance Board of the State of New Jersey to prescribe reports pertaining to the local fiscal affairs; and

WHEREAS, the Local Finance Board has promulgated N.J.A.C. 5:30-6.5, a regulation requiring that the governing body of each municipality shall by resolution certify to the Local Finance Board of the State of New Jersey that all members of the governing body have reviewed, as a minimum, the sections of the annual audit entitled "Comments" and "Recommendations"; and

WHEREAS, the members of the governing body of the Borough of Neptune City have personally reviewed as a minimum the Annual Report of Audit, and specifically the sections of the Annual Audit entitled "Comments and Recommendations, as evidenced by the group affidavit form of the governing body attached hereto; and

WHEREAS, such resolution of certification shall be adopted by the Governing Body no later than forty-five days after the receipt of the annual audit, pursuant to N.J.A.C. 5:30-6.5; and

WHEREAS, all members of the governing body have received and have familiarized themselves with, at least, the minimum requirements of the Local Finance Board of the State of New Jersey, as stated aforesaid and have subscribed to the affidavit, as provided by the Local Finance Board; and

WHEREAS, failure to comply with the regulations of the Local Finance Board of the State of New Jersey may subject the members of the local governing body to the penalty provisions of R.S. 52:27BB-52.
