Mayor Wardell also noted that the 48 hour notice was advertised and posted as required

Councilmember Sullivan arrived at 6:09pm.

**PRESENTATIONS –**

Peter Lupo, Vice President of outreach for Veterans Chamber of Commerce gave a presentation on becoming a veteran friendly municipality. He stated that the requests were 5% workforce, 5% RFP, and 3 veterans only parking spaces. He spoke about the importance of bringing awareness for what our armed forces veterans do. This initiative is a great service to our veterans and active military.

**BOARD OF EDUCATION REPORT:**

Board President Anthony Susino reported that the school has hired a new CSA and introduced Dr. Raymond J Boccuti. He also reported that Asbury Park Press has approached him about changing the schools name and would like to involve the residents. Dr. Boccuti spoke about how excited he is to be hired by the Board of Education and is looking forward to working together.

## **BOROUGH ADMINISTRATORS REPORT: Christopher Cherbini**

A/Cherbini reported

- 1) Update on parks
  - a. First Responders Park (Irrigation, Committee to finish monuments) Grass will be cut this week
  - b. Memorial Park (Projects beginning shortly) Thank you DPW for all the work
- 2) Councilperson Pappas is working with me to make improvement to west Sylvania Ave on new cross walks and possible shoulder/bike lanes. We have had contact with the county engineer and progress is being made to get this project going at no cost to the borough.
- 3) We have received information on the Monmouth county open space grant. I have reached out to the recreation board and we are going to be looking at project to improve Adams Field. I will present a plan by the August meeting.
- 4) Finally, I want to put on record for the Mayor, Council, and the residents my appreciation for the hard work and dedication of all our employees through these difficult times. We are one of the first municipalities to open to the public and serve this community. All our Borough Employees have stepped up, worked hard and I for one am proud of the determination and strength the show each day.

## **MAYORS REPORT: Mayor Andrew Wardell**

Mayor Wardell reported:

### **I. Updates on Covid-19**

- A. Monmouth County has reported today 10,185 positive cases
  1. The numbers of individuals infected with Covid have remained low with no serious spikes
- B. Neptune City has 72 cases
  1. These numbers have fluctuated as suspected cases are automatically counted, but when tests come back negative the numbers are changed.

### **II. First Responders**

- A. I want to thank all the work of our first responders and DPW throughout this entire pandemic.
  1. Police have been very cooperative with the Mayor, council, and Administrator to establish safety protocols for the residents and employees alike.
  2. DPW has worked to ensure our public places of gatherings have been sanitized daily and have kept our busy parks clean.

3. Our FD and FA have continually answered the call to help our residents on almost a daily basis

### III. Covid-19 Testing Center

- A. The County Freeholders held a press conference last week to announce their initiative to increase testing for its residents, particularly for those who have not had access previously.
  1. No prescription or insurance necessary
  2. Do not need to be symptomatic.
- B. There are multiple facilities but Neptune would best serve our residents.
  1. Neptune:
    - a. Friday July 31st 9am-1pm at 60 Neptune Blvd. (Neptune BOE building) in the north parking lot.
    - b. Thursday August 6th 3-6 at Midtown school
    - c. Wednesday August 12th, 9am-1pm at Midtown school
  2. This is free and tests can be done both orally and nasal.

### IV. Park updates

- A. First Responder's Park
  1. Waiting on the sprinkler system to be installed is the cause of the delay. DPW is going to address the overgrowth in the meanwhile.
  2. Committee has been formed to finalize the monuments for each honored group. The center/large circle will be where our 9/11 memorial will be placed.
- B. Joe Freda Park
  1. The new fence has been erected and the rubber surface has been repaired.
- C. Memorial Park
  1. There was a bit of confusion regarding the borough during one of Gov. Murphy's press conferences.
  2. Gazebo and playground equipment have been ordered.
  3. ADA accessible ramps have been added to the beach to allow more access to those who are wheelchair bound or need sturdier ground to walk on.
  4. Parking was an issue that was brought to my attention and with the help of NCPD we were able to devise a plan to limit parking to one side of Riverview on Saturday and Sunday. Residents of Riverview have informed us that it has helped tremendously.

### V. Community Events:

- A. Movies in the Park
  1. We had our first movie in the park, very successful
- a. We have rescheduled our "Christmas in July" celebration to this upcoming Thursday
- B. Several other events have taken place; Yoga in the park, Candy Bingo, Family kickball, and more to come
- C. Lastly, I had the pleasure of meeting with Woodrow Wilson's new CSA Dr. Boccutti today, along with Councilman Thomas. It was a nice and productive meeting. We share many of the same goals for WWES and look forward to working together.

**ADMINISTRATION & FINANCE- Brian Thomas**

C/Thomas reported that he is looking forward to working with the Veterans initiative. He also thanked the Board of Rec and Community Center for their part of holding the movies in the park and thanked DPW for helping everything to run smoothly. C/Thomas also reported that the senior freeze is up in the air until the states budget is finalized in September.

Mayor Wardell mentioned that he spoke with Senator Gopal and his going to expedite our concerns with the flooding on Third and 35 with the state.

**PUBLIC WORKS- Brian Sullivan**

C/Sullivan reported that the is top notch. He mentioned the sweeper had been repaired and it will be going through this week. He also reported that DPW have been doing landscaping on Memorial Park including trimming trees. He also noted that there has been an increase on the brush that is picked up.

**LAW & ORDINANCE – Dave Calhoun**

C/Calhoun reported he had no report but would like to call a meeting next week. He also mentioned that he is very happy with the Kayak racks and that DPW did a nice job. As the liaison to the Board of Recreation, he is happy with the movies in the park

**ADMINISTRATION & JUSTICE-Danielle Pappas**

C/Pappas reported she had no report but wanted to thank all first responders and borough employees for the great job they are doing, and the Borough Council, we are a great team.

**SPECIAL SERVICES-Pamela Renee**

C/Renee reported she wanted to thank the First Responders, DPW and Chris Cherbini for the work they do. She also reported that there are 206 dogs licensed and late fees will begin on August 1 for dog licenses. She reminded residents that the TNR program with the SPCA is intended for the entire town. If you feed feral cats, you should consider becoming a colony caregiver. To get more information contact Borough Hall. Due to COVID, we have only Trapped and released a total of 8 cats in total.

**HUMAN SERVICES- Glen Kocsis**

C/Kocsis reported that he had no report and thanked the Fire Department, First Aid and all Borough Employees.

**PUBLIC PARTICIPATION (FOR AGENDA ITEMS ONLY) -**

Jen Coombs asked for additional information on Resolution 20-109 and Resolution 20-110 on the agenda. A/Cherbini explained the intent for both resolutions and explained the importance of document and training management. Ms. Coombs asked if the PD was accredited? A/Cherbini explained that no, but our officers are up to date with training and with this program, when training becomes immediately available the Chief will be notified and the info can be forwarded to the officers.

## **NEW BUSINESS**

### **Resolution 20-105 Establishing goals for contracting, hiring and recognizing military**

Mayor Wardell read the resolution into the record.

C/Thomas offered the following resolution and moved its adoption. Seconded by C/Sullivan

#### **Resolution 2020-105 RESOLUTION 20-105**

#### **A RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING GOALS FOR CONTRACTING WITH VETERAN OWNED BUSINESS ENTERPRISES, HIRING VETERANS IN THE MUNICIPAL WORKFORCE AND RECOGNIZING THE MILITARY SERVICE OF RESIDENTS IN THE CIVIC AFFAIRS OF THE BOROUGH OF NEPTUNE CITY**

**WHEREAS**, the New Jersey Local Public Contracts Law, N.J.S.A. 40A:11-1 et. seq. (the “LPCL”) permits counties and municipalities to establish by resolution qualified veteran-owned business enterprise (VOB) and service-connected disabled veterans owned business enterprise (SDVOB) contracting programs; known as veterans business entities (VBE) and

**WHEREAS**, the LPCL further authorizes municipalities to establish goals for the municipality in setting aside a certain percentage of the dollar value of total procurements to be awarded as contract to VBEs; and

**WHEREAS**, the LPCL provides that municipalities that have set goals for contracts awarded to VOBs shall make a good faith effort to attain any goal by tracking the award of contracts to VBEs; and

**WHEREAS**, the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Neptune City recognizes the importance of publicly recognizing veterans for their service in the normal course of carrying out local government functions; and

**WHEREAS**, the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Neptune City has determined that, subject to the compliance with the LPCL and other state regulations concerning procurement that it is in the best interest of the Borough to encourage the participation of veterans in the business of local government, the workforce and in the civic affairs of the community.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED**, by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Neptune City, that the following goals are hereby established:

- 1) Proactively notify veteran-owned businesses registered with the State of New Jersey <https://business.njveteranschamber.com/list> of each public bid opportunity;

- 2) In the procurement of goods and services and construction, in accordance with N.J.S.A. 40A:11-42(d), the Borough shall make a good faith effort to award 6% of the total contract dollars to Veteran Business Enterprises. In achieving this goal, the Borough shall consider the portion of any public contract awarded that may be performed by a VOB or SDVOB subcontractor;
- 3) In the Procurement of goods and services and construction, in accordance with N.J.S.A. 40A:11-42(d), for contracts awarded to non-veteran prime vendors, where there are not three qualified veteran bidders, we shall request that 6% of the contract be awarded to qualified veteran subcontractors who are certified in the state of New Jersey in the New Jersey Selective Assistance Vendor Information (NJ SAVI) database;
- 4) In the hiring of employees, the Borough, shall make a good faith effort to achieve the goal of a minimum 5% veteran workforce;
- 5) Hold at least one "Patriot Day" public celebration honoring the service of veterans on Memorial Day, Veterans Day and/or the anniversary of 9-11;
- 6) Public recognition of the service of a resident of the community who has served in the military on an annual basis. (During Memorial Day Festivities)
- 7) Establish (3) Veterans Only Parking Spot in borough parking lots.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that in order to achieve the goals established by this resolution the Borough shall make best efforts, in accordance with N.J.S.A. 40A:11-43, to advertise to the VOB and SDVOB community the Borough goals, to track the award of public contracts to VOBs and SDVOB subcontractors and assist those enterprises in the participation of the procurement process.

## **PUBLIC COMMENT**

Mr. Greg Defoe 134 Summit Avenue, has serious concerns with feral cats in his neighborhood. He has picked up cat feces from his yard 39 times in the month of June. These cats are from 137 and 139 Summit Avenue and said the homes are inhabitable in his opinion. The homes are dilapidated and the smell of cat urine from them is repulsive. He asked A/Cherbini where we were at with the process of doing something about the cats and properties. A/Cherbini explained we are moving forward with the process of removing the cats with the SPCA. Mr. Defoe asked what the plan is for the condemned properties, he feels it is dragging down the value of his and his neighbor's property. A/Cherbini explained the property maintenance is a separate situation that will be addressed but the priority is the cat situation. Mr. Defoe pleaded to do something about the cats and the homes, he cannot even walk his dog outside or allow family members to play in the grass in his yard. To walk past the property nauseates him from the smell. A/Cherbini reassured Mr. Defoe that in a few days he should see some action. It is in law enforcements hands and that he will be there when they come to the property so he can know what the plan is. The County, SPCA and code enforcement are involved. M/Wardell stated he is sorry that he has to live in the situation and that the borough is taking it seriously. He also mentioned that when we became involved in the TNR program last year and were told it is a 5-6-year plan before we will see a significant drop in numbers. Mr. Defoe asked if it was illegal to feed feral cats? If not, can we possibly get something on the books? Attorney Sena stated that we will look at all available options. A/Cherbini reiterated, that the priority is removing the cats, then cleaning the property. If necessary, the town will get involved and place a lien on the property. Mr. Defoe asked if people are responsible for cats, are they responsible for cleaning up after them? Mayor Wardell stated he empathizes with his situation but we have legal parameters to follow and are taking it very seriously. Mr. Defoe asked to please expediate the situation.

Shana Howell, 14 Boston Road asked who is responsible for enforcing Borough Ordinances? She has concerns with Carport. The property is not being maintained, and they have cars parked on public streets. They previously have been parked over 200 days and currently there is a car parked over 100 days on Boston Road. Ms. Howell also stated her concern with parking situation on Boston. Previously there was one side of the street parking on weekends and holidays but the sign has been removed. She would like to see it put back up or see a resident only parking sign. She also mentioned that the garbage that is strewn throughout the street is a bit much and the owners at Kelly's are constantly picking it up. A/Cherbini stated that he and the Chief will check on the unregistered vehicles and parking ordinance. A/Cherbini will also check into the carport business plan that was submitted when they opened.

Larry Scott and Ms. Dunak from Third Avenue stated they are present to represent their neighbors on Third Avenue. He mentioned that he has been working on this with the Borough for 11 months. Mr. Scott asked about property zone changes. How do these changes impact properties that are non-confirming with conditional use? A/Cherbini asked Mr. Scott to contact him in the office to schedule an appointment to speak with him with the details. Mr. Scott stated he feels that laws are being violated and he is losing confidence in Borough authority. He has a concern because of pending land use appeal on August 11, 2020.

Jenn Coombs, asked if the papers that Mr. Scott handed Borough Attorney Sena were public record? A/Sena said that the paperwork needed to be reviewed. Mr. Scott stated that the info was obtained through OPRA. Jenn asked if she could obtain a copy.
